WM Families and Staff,

The most recent COVID data for Carver County was released by the Minnesota Department of Health this morning. The county is at **18.82** COVID-19 cases per 10,000 people for the period of October 4, 2020 through October 17, 2020. This is an increase from the numbers reported last week, **16.33**/10,000 (for the period September 27, 2020 through October 10, 2020). This is the third consecutive week that we have seen an increase in our county numbers. Our current numbers justify that we do not need to adjust our learning models at this time. However, as county data continues to trend upwards, and our neighboring counties of Wright (32.77) and Hennepin (28.88) are seeing increased rates, we continue to monitor and consult with our local health officials on the safest learning model moving forward.

Please keep in mind that we continue to look at other data points as we make decisions regarding learning models. We will continue to look for trends rather than short term data points before shifting to a different learning model. Additional data points and scenarios that may influence learning models include:

- Watertown and Mayer community case data
- Data trends in our PreK-12 schools
- Staffing shortages
- Cohorts of students in guarantine
- Further direction by the Minnesota Department of Health

Update on WM School District Cases

Since the start of the school year on August 31st we have had the following school related cases. A school related case is one that involves the potential exposure of other students or staff members to an infected individual.

- 3 positive student COVID-19 cases
- 2 positive staff COVID-19 cases
- 2 cohorts of students that have had to guarantine
